Single Red River Métis Mother's Inspiring Journey to Success

rom scraping a living through multiple jobs to provide for her four children, to earning a business accounting certificate and landing a fulfilling job, Kathaleen Lavallee's inspiring story is a testament to her resilience and that hard work pays off - no matter your situation.

Before emerging as a beacon of hope for the Red River Métis, Lavallee, was grappling with a relentless cycle of financial challenges she faced as a single mother. Finding that her current education was hindering her earning potential, Lavallee found herself juggling five different jobs to make ends meet for her family.

Recognizing she was in a race against time, Lavallee enrolled in the grueling business accounting program through Louis Riel Vocational College (LRVC).

Kathaleen's program ordinarily would take 18 months, but was condensed to an intense nine months due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the challenges brought on by the pandemic and the necessity to study online, all while homeschooling her children. Lavallee remained undeterred. She used this as an opportunity to set an example for her children that perseveranc wins against all odds, adversity, and hours in the day.



"There were times when I wanted to give up. But I pushed through because I wanted to show my kids that they can do anything they put their mind to," Lavallee admitted, revealing an important part of her winning mantra.

Lavallee's journey to success began the moment when she decided to go return to school at the age of 49. Supported by the Métis Employment & Training (MET) Department at the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF), Lavallee was able to successfully graduate from her program at LRVC and expand her horizon of career opportunities.

MET's support program was a critical role in her success, empowering her to connect with peers and create a supportive study environment.

"I'm so grateful for their support," Lavallee said. "Because of the help I received through MET, I could afford to focus on my studies and make the most of the opportunity while making sure my family was taken care of," she said.

Lavallee's remarkable journey doesn't stop at transforming her own life. Now employed as a Project Officer at MET, she uses her firsthand knowledge to guide others facing similar hardships.

"I understand the unique struggles of being a single mother trying to better yourself and others – and I feel I can reach out to others in similar situations and show them that it's possible to achieve success, no matter how difficult life seems, and no matter how old or young you are," she explains. Lavallee's mission is to help the next generation of Red River Métis chart their own paths and strive toward achieving their goals.

She thrives on the opportunity to encourage youth to leverage the MET's services and champion their own success stories, fuelled by their entrepreneurial spirit. "Going back to school wasn't easy, but it paid off," she said.

An inspiration to many, her story continues to underline the transformative power of education.

"Not only am I making a good living, but I'm also making a difference in peoples' lives and for the Red River Métis Nation," Lavallee said.

Her journey, driven in part by her tenacity and resilience, is a narrative of ambition and believing in oneself.

Graduate Eager to Start Teaching

Red River Métis bowler Brittney Rocan may have just graduated from college and university, but the Red River Métis

student is already counting the days until she starts her new career in the fall.

Prittney Rocan has spent the past five years attending Red River College Polytech and the University of Winnipeg for her Industrial Arts/Technology Teacher Education Degree.

The Youth grew up working in the garage and spending time outdoors with her father, and Rocan's grandpa was a welder, which helped influence her passion for woodworking.

The Red River Métis graduate recalled attending a Girls Exploring Trades & Technology camp through Red River College (Polytechnic) in middle school, which further propelled her dream of working in the field.

"I always wanted to be a teacher since (I was in) kindergarten, and I just didn't know what kind of teacher I wanted to be until I went to that trades camp, as well as taking woods class in high school," she said. "Then, I realized that's the kind of teacher I wanted to be."

Rocan would attend the University of Winnipeg (U of W) and Red River College Polytech

on alternating days. As a student her experiences were quite unique, noticing distinct differences between college and university. "In college, you have super small class sizes, so I gained some great friendships over the five years," said Rocan. "In university, you meet more people because of the bigger class sizes. It was a good challenge, being in both schools."

During Rocan's first and second years of university, she taught Grade 6-12 students graphic design and woodworking at Grant Park High School. The aspiring teacher also taught woodworking and power and energy at Bernie Wolfe School. This year, the graduate had the chance to return to her high school in Lorette to teach her minor study, drama. She had the privilege of being mentored by her former high school band teacher.

"Being able to work with the person that taught you is pretty surreal," she said. While teaching in Lorette, Rocan was able to help run the school musical. "It was cool to be there from November to April

because I was there for the whole process of the musical," she said. "Compared to my other practicums, which were eight straight weeks at the end of the school year."

While attending school, the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF) helped the Red River Métis Youth financially through the Post-Secondary Education Support Program. In addition, she was assigned a mentor from the Métis Employment & Training (MET), who she could count on for valuable guidance and support as she begins her new career.

Rocan appreciates the help from the MMF and encourages other Youth to reach out for support. "It was nice having someone check up on you, see how you're doing, and want to know where you're finding a job after school," she said. "I thought that was good."

"They have a lot available, whether it's financially or through mentorship," said the graduate. "I thought the MET program was a big help."

The Red River Métis Youth kindly offered valuable tips for those venturing into post-secondary education: try your best to build new connections and friendships along the way.

"It's all about who you know later on down the road and see who you can rely on and ask questions to," she said. "I have a few classmates who are also Red River Métis. We've become good

friends and always help each other out."

Now that Rocan has wrapped up her education, she is excited to begin teaching full-time in the fall. "I'm going to be moving to work in Manitou, and I'll be teaching woodworking," she said. "I got a permanent position right off the bat, which is nice."

The graduate is moving on to a new stage in her bowling journey as well. The Red River Métis Citizen has received many accolades in the sport including capturing five medals and being named the Senior Girls All Events Champion at the Canadian Tenpin Federation 2022 Youth Championships.

Rocan has since aged out of youth leagues and transitioned to playing in adult leagues. She received her coaching certificate and was able to help coach Team Manitoba at the Canadian Tenpin Federation 2023 Youth Championships in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario.

"One of the kids I coached won two silver medals. I've never felt prouder because now I know what my coach felt like for the last 12 years. I think it was easy to relate to kids because I know exactly how they feel in that high-stakes situation," she said. "I have my ways that I deal with (the pressure), so passing on that information and knowledge helps them when they're bowling."



Shaping the Future of Construction

Heavy Equipment Operator (HEO) Training Program Sets Red River Métis Students up for Success

It's 7:45 am sharp on a brisk June morning. A group of hardworking students met at the worksite, eagerly waiting to dive into their hands-on learning experiences. They are participating in the Heavy Equipment Operator (HEO) Training Program, an initiative that's carving out a new path for aspiring construction professionals.

The HEO program combines five weeks of rigorous, practical training comnined with class-room lessons. Sponsored in partnership with the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF) through the Métis Employment & Training (MET) team, it's a game-changing ladder to success in the heavy construction industry.

The program not only taught the skills needed to operate heavy machinery, but also ingrained essential industry expectations. It includes comprehensive modules on Workplace Hazardous Material Information System (WHMIS), Lock Out/Tag Out processes, and Load Securement.

Graduates of this program don't just come out as skilled operators; they come out as dependable, prepared, and reliable individuals. They learn the importance of punctuality, with eight students boasting perfect attendance and others falling just a few minutes short.

The training day typically runs from 7:45 am to 5:30 pm.

There's no pressure of operating a single piece of equipment all day long. The students switch machines in the afternoon, offering them a broader exposure and hands-on familiarity with different types of equipment.

An intensive focus on maintenance is another commendable feature of the HEO training program. The mentors, real-life industry experts, explain the importance of machine upkeep through vivid comparisons—grease to a machine is what water is to our bodies.

The latest batch of graduates, having completed their training on June 16, 2023, are eager to dive headfirst into the industry. Jason Leclerc, a driving force with MET behind this transformative initiative, is looks forward to new partnerships and future programs. "We are so proud of them," he exclaims, echoing the sentiments of the entire MET team.

The HEO Training Program is more than just a qualification; it's a comprehensive learning experience that transforms aspiring individuals into industry-ready professionals.

She recounts, "The challenges of this job as a healthcare aide will give me room for growth and keep me hungry to learn more." "Without MMF's funding, I wouldn't have been able to complete this program. They helped with my costs for tuition and some of my day-to-day needs."

In an industry as ever-evolving as healthcare, Dueck's academic pursuits are a testament to her tenacity. She was not simply content with passing grades, but found herself pushing for higher marks, every 90% only fueling her desire to reach the next level.

However, this journey did not come without its fair share of hurdles. Financial constraints, exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, posed a significant threat to her academic pursuits. This is where the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF), through the Métis Employment & Training Department stepped in.

With MET's support, Dueck could offset her tuition costs and cover some of her daily needs. Fiscally and morally, the MMF's support helped her to excel academically and professionally. She said, "The MMF really made it possible for me to go to school this year."

Armed with her diploma, Dueck has landed a position with Gilas Healthcare Services, a health agency that sends workers across Manitoba to different facilities. With every job being first come, first serve, Dueck has the unique opportunity to travel and explore various facilities and

Selkirk Fiddle Player Nominated for three MCMAs

A Selkirk teen is nominated for three Manitoba Country Music Awards. Morgan Grace is a 16-year-old fiddle player with strong Red River Métis roots. She began playing the violin when she was four, and hasn't put it down since.

Grace was raised around music. Even before she came out of the womb, she was surrounded by the songs of her ancestors and the joy their music brings her family. Watching their family friends play the fiddle inspired her to try, and the rest is history.

"Being around it, she just seemed to like that sound, that aspect," her father Keith Ginther said. "She seemed to have an ear for it."

When Grace's family first put a fiddle in her hand, they discovered she played it left-handed instead of the usual right. That adjustment didn't halt Grace or her development as a fiddle player at all - she learned to play left just the same, and the music started flowing out of her, Ginther said.

"A lot of people comment that she looks bored when she plays," he said. "It just comes easily and effortlessly. I think it's because it's been in her since before she was born."

Grace has had eight fiddle teachers, each instructing her in different techniques to shape her personal style. Incredibly, she learned the instrument completely through ear — not with sheet music.

"A lot of musicians read sheet music," she said. "I can't do it with fiddle." So, she listens to each piece over and over, figuring out the notes completely through what she hears.

Her favourite pieces to play are waltz. She describes the slower music as therapeutic, beautiful and graceful.

Grace's first gig was at Selkirk's Indigenous
Days six years ago and she has continued to
play at venues since, including Dauphin's
Countryfest, the Métis festival in Batoche, North
American Indigenous Games, the Winnipeg Jets
Indigenous game and she's opened for William
Prince, a Juno award winning artist.

Her favourite places to play are much smaller, quiet places. She adores playing in personal care homes, something she does once or twice a month in the winter.

"I like seeing how [music] affects them," she said. "How when these people, they can't talk or they can't do certain things, but you can see them tapping their fingers or toes."

Grace is a cover artist. She's nominated in the emerging artist, cover/tribute artist, duo or group of the year, and specialty band or artist categories in this year's Country Music Awards.

"I'm kind of hoping to win something but it's still great to be nominated," she said.

Her dad said the nominations are largely because of her following. "The people that support Morgan and her fans are instrumental in where she is today," he said.

Grace will be attending the awards with her mom, dad, boyfriend and numerous family members. Coming up, she'll be playing at the Indigenous Tourism Manitoba gala, Honouring the Languages at Lower Fort Garry, and the Selkirk Métis Local Fiddle Jamboree.

The music awards are on Nov. 4 at the Club Regent Event Centre.





From Apartheid to Transitional Justice

Truth & Reconciliation Insights from a Red River Métis Student's Journey into Post-apartheid South Africa

Katherine Fleury, a young Red River Métis student, spent a summer abroad in South Africa, where she reflected on themes of truth and reconciliation that cross borders and cultures.

n the middle of July, the usually tranquil wineland region of Stellenbosch, South Africa, was abuzz with the profound, reflective insights of 40 young minds from 22 nationalities, all in attendance for the Association of Commonwealth Universities summer school program. Among these was a proud Red River Métis student from Manitoba, who brought with her a deeply personal and professional

interest rooted in research, public policy, and veterinary sciences.

The program, set against the backdrop of an apartheid-scarred South Africa, focused on themes of truth and reconciliation, diving deep into the country's history and drawing comparisons with other cultures. A significant insight is realized here - the histories of various countries, though separated by vast oceans, run parallel, connected by the shared experiences of colonization - from apartheid to transitional justice.

Katherine Fleury, the 23-year-old Red River Métis student, experienced a rare privilege on her visit to South Africa - the ability to choose whether or not to disclose her Indigenous ancestry. As she returned to Canada, she was keenly aware of the opportunities and equality that sharing her heritage had opened up, leading her to reflect on the invaluable contribution that truth and reconciliation has made towards establishing a more just and equitable society.

Exploring the socio-political landscape that molded 20th-century South Africa provided the

students an invaluable perspective, and our Red River Métis scholar found resonance with her own country's history. The narratives of colonization were disturbing and sobering, yet also a testament to the indomitable human spirit.

The stark inequality plaguing post-apartheid South Africa was striking to the participants. This intense experience amplified an understanding of Black consciousness during apartheid—an insight that demands attention and respect.

The paradox of "white passing" indigeneity was a significant topic of reflection. While ethnic disclosure remains a choice for some, including our Red River Métis participant, it's pivotal to recognize the privilege that modern realities afford them. They do not bear the scars of past atrocities their ancestors suffered.

The course left her with empowering learning's and inspired her to move forward with real actions to promote equality. From an understanding of the bigger picture around marginalized communities and critical analysis of the systems that perpetuate inequality, to a healthy outward representation of the epistemology that values all people - these are the truths that Fleury draws on as she pursues her dream of becomming a Veterinarian.

The skills that Fleury acquired

through her study abroad endeavour has etched in her the importance of being a host, rather than a guest, in creating positive change.

Ultimately, it is stories like Katherine's, lived experiences, and the emotionally moving reflections that remind us of the importance of unity and resilience, encouraging us all to keep moving forward, together, in the face of adversity and systems that try to divide us.

This deep dive into the intricate tapestry of Indigenous heritage inspired a firm resolve. To use this privileged state not as a sanctuary, but as a platform to amplify ancestral voices and continue their legacy. After all, every country has its crucial historical narratives and traumas in desperate need of reconciliation and remedy.

The Red River Métis scholar, in drawing on her experiences

in South Africa, distilled her learnings into crucial takeaways about the importance of understanding systems and beneficiaries of inequality, being cautious of political stunts, conducting community research, examining underlying philosophical growth, and recognizing that justice is an act to be performed, not simply an end state.

Imparting an understanding of the importance of truth and reconciliation for establishing a more equitable and just society, Katherine's experience underscores the power of global exchange and the significance of the study of African history, often marginalized in international discourse.

Quoting Nelson Mandela, the renowned leader who served as South Africa's first democratically elected president in 1994 to 1999, Katherine urges us all to make choices that reflect our hopes and passions, rather than our fears.



Lifelong Friends Launch Nursing Careers in Ashern



But her journey started even earlier with summer employment as a health-care aide at Stonewall Hospital.




It gave me an appreciation of how hard our leadership teams work to serve our communities in the best possible way."

Kaylee expressed gratitude for these foundational work experiences, as well as for resources that helped along the way, such as the Home for the Summer program offered by Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority.

"I also had the opportunity to work as a health-care aide full-time for several summers through generous funding from the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF) in collaboration with Indigenous Human Resources at IERHA. The Grow Your Own Bursary program was essential for funding my education but also in ensuring that I would work within my communities and give back some day," she said.

"These resources were so impactful throughout my education in preparing me for my career every step of the way. I was able to gain valuable clinical and leadership experiences as a student through the various positions, and the funding allowed me to worry less about tuition and more about focusing on my courses and eventually giving back to my communities."



Looking back, Kaylee always knew she wanted to work in health care but was particularly drawn to nursing.

"Nursing is very hands-on and you get to be personable with patients and clients," she said. "There is also so much opportunity for growth, whether that be moving into leadership or there is always an opportunity to continue learning as you move into different fields of nursing."

At the same time, she is also grateful for the chance to work in the Interlake. "As a new nurse, I wanted the feeling of working close to home while still gaining a wide variety of clinical experiences. Here at Ashern, I get the opportunity to work closely with a large Indigenous population and serve the surrounding communities, including my own," said Kaylee, who now lives in Eriksdale.

"I feel proud to be a part of the growing number of Indigenous health-care professionals within our region and to feel supported," she said.

Similar to Kaylee, Taylor always knew she wanted to pursue a career that would allow her to make a positive impact on other people's lives. "Nursing is a profession where you are able to do that every day — this is what initially drew me to the career. I enjoy nursing because you get to meet people from all walks of life and are able to be there and help them during a time of need," said Taylor, who graduated in June from the University College of the North in Selkirk.

"In addition, I like that it is very hands-on and that every day brings a new challenge. I like that there is so much opportunity for continuous learning and growth within the profession."

Ashern Hospital is already familiar ground for Taylor, who completed a three-month senior practicum placement there, with the majority of her shifts in the emergency room.

"This is integral to me as a new nurse because I am able to continue to enhance my clinical knowledge, critical thinking skills and gain more hands-on experience, all while being in a rural hospital close to home.

"Working at Ashern Hospital gives me the opportunity to provide health care to a large Indigenous population and many surrounding communities

within the Interlake-Eastern region, including my own," said Taylor, who continues to reside in St. Laurent.

"It felt really good to obtain fulltime permanent employment within the IERHA as a new grad nurse. I am proud to work at a hospital that serves so many communities within the Interlake-Eastern region."

In addition, Taylor expressed gratitude for the help she received from the Manitoba Métis Federation throughout her post-secondary education. "The MMF partnered with the University College of the North to deliver the nursing program in Selkirk. They funded myself and 13 other Red River Métis students throughout the entirety of the program."

"This resource meant a lot to me and was crucial during my education, as it allowed me to focus solely on my studies and excel within the program," she said.

"I strongly encourage others to utilize the available programs and funding that are offered to Métis post-secondary students pursuing a career in healthcare. All of the support that is out there truly helps in being successful throughout your program and chosen career path."

Nursing education is an invaluable part of providing quality health care services and training the next generation of health care providers in the Interlake- Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA).

Tanya Cheetham, chief nursing officer and regional lead for acute care and public health for Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA), draws attention to opportunities in the Interlake to obtain nursing education close to home.

The recent course at Assiniboine Community College in Arborg, held in partnership with Fieldstone Ventures and IERHA, was successful in bringing 25 nursing students to the region.

"Coaching and mentoring junior staff and students is a professional expectation of all nurses by their regulatory bodies. We thank the nurses and care teams that welcomed students and supported them in their learning journey."

"We welcome nursing students to the IERHA and will provide safe environments that foster learning and growth. Once the students complete their practicums, we want them to begin their nursing careers in the IERHA."

"We're pleased to offer employment opportunities for our local Métis community," says Lariviere. "Having the community's support and benefitting from Meagan's contribution to our team, it's a win-win."

The journey at St. Malo Meats goes to show how programs like SSEP can not only foster economic growth for Red River Métis businesses, but also empower communities with employment and training opportunities, as well as financial support.

Gosselin and Lariviere concluded, "We can't express enough our gratitude towards the MMF for supporting us through this program. The positive impact goes beyond the business, leaving a lasting mark on the community as a whole."

Pupil Pursuing Physics Passion



uate Cole Coughlin noticed he had an aptitude for math, physics, and computer science throughout his secondary school days.

"I sort of pictured myself as maybe developing an app and then retiring early, and then going back to school and maybe studying philosophy or something," he said. "But near the end of high school I realized that I could just pursue a topic that I'm very interested in from the beginning, like physics."

He completed his joint honours degree in physics and computer science at the University of Manitoba over five years. While physics is his true passion, Coughlin found computer science to be beneficial as well.

"Computer science is now incredibly useful in physics, and



it's necessary to know how to code nowadays, so it ended up being a really great degree and has really helped me out in many, many ways," he said.

The pandemic ramped up towards the end of his third year, with classes immediately moving online. In summer of 2020, Coughlin got a position at McGill University in Montreal, Que., researching particle physics.

"If it were a normal summer, I would have been out in Montreal for the summer and working with the group there," he said. "But, I was able to do all my work virtually and had regular meetings with the team, and it ended up being a great experience regardless."

Classes remained online the following year, and Coughlin was one of a few Canadians selected for a research position through

an international student program with the European Organization for Nuclear Research in Geneva, Switzerland, which ended up being virtual.

"So, there's two summer trips that I missed during the pandemic," he said. "Regardless, they were truly incredible experiences, and I'm so lucky to have been selected for those positions." In August, the University of Manitoba graduate will head to the Perimeter Institute for Theoretical Physics in Waterloo, Ont.

"I'm truly thrilled to be going there. It's one of the most selective institutions in the world for physics," he said. "They select around 25 students every year from many, many different countries, and despite being in Waterloo, there's only I think maybe two other Canadians going there along with me."

Coughlin said he has already communicated with some of the students in his cohort." They already made a group chat of all the students that'll be going there for the next year, and we all introduced ourselves. I counted all the countries that everyone is from and it's like 20 different countries the 26 of us are from," he said, "so it's going to be an incredible time and I'm going to make lots of friends from all around the world who I can visit in the future. I couldn't be more excited about it."

The Perimeter Institute offers a one-year master's degree, which is entirely course-based. "Every

course is about five weeks, and we're taking two, maybe three of them at the same time, and it's a 10-month program. Sort of everyone's just working through all the courses together for the first semester and then the second semester you have a bit more choice in the specialization of the classes that you want to go into," Coughlin said.

The Red River Métis student is hoping to specialize in quantum information theory, which he said is becoming increasingly favourable to theoretical physicists.

"It's a new way of looking at physics as we see it today, and hopefully in search of a theory of quantum gravity. We today are unable to unify two of our greatest theories in physics," he said, referring to quantum mechanics and gravity.

"Quantum mechanics has been experimentally shown for over 100 years, and we have an incredible theory that predicts all the things that we see in quantum mechanics for the most part, but we still don't fully understand it, and it tends to confuse physicists regardless all the time," Coughlin said.

"But we also have an incredible theory of gravity, which is general relativity, and these two theories seem incompatible. They do not fit together, but they both exist in the same universe, and we know that they have to. So, we've been searching for a theory that will encompass both

of them, and we're still searching for one that is able to experimentally show that it is part of the same theory."

The graduate is excited to further pursue this passion for a master's degree. The Perimeter Institute has an incredible faculty that are working on quantum information, and I am thrilled to be able to sit down and talk with many of them over the next year," he said.

Beyond the next year, Coughlin hopes to help in the search for a theory of everything. "Something that can describe all of the phenomena we see in the universe," he said.

He also plans to obtain his PhD and become a professor. "I truly love teaching. It's not only a great way to engage with students, but also test your own knowledge, and every time I try to prepare lectures or slides or try to explain an idea to someone else, I learn something in return as well," he said.

"Being able to explain these ideas in an engaging and interesting way is truly important."

He credits great communicators like Carl Sagan, John Carroll, Carlo Rovelli, and his own teachers for his decision to pursue physics. "I think science communication is incredibly important," he said. "I would love to be a professor and conduct my own research and teach as well. That's the dream."

The Red River Métis graduate has also been able to teach

through the Kinew Métis Council, which he joined when he moved from his hometown of Selkirk to Winnipeg about a year ago. Through the Council, Coughlin has presented on topics such as astronomy and particle physics.

"I gave a very fun and compelling talk about our history of the knowledge of the scale of the universe, and it's quite incredible looking at the sort of turn of events," he said, noting that it took thousands of years, through the evolution of telescopes, for astronomers to realize that other galaxies outside of our own existed.

"For thousands and thousands of years we questioned and thought about how big was this universe of ours? Was it just the earth and the backdrop of the sky? And slowly we built better telescopes and saw some things further away than we expected, and even less than 100 years

ago we didn't know that other galaxies outside of our own existed," he said. "Edwin Hubble, with one of the most powerful telescopes at the time, was able to show that objects existed outside of our own universe, which we now call the Milky Way galaxy. But that was the entire universe to us at that point, and since then we've discovered a seemingly infinite number of galaxies."

The budding physicist's talk also covered the fact that the universe extends much further than currently known. "We don't have any real reason to believe that it doesn't extend much further than we can see, so the universe continues to get bigger and bigger and bigger," he said.

"It was a really fun talk to sort of explore that." The opportunity to present on topics he's enthusiastic about isn't the only benefit Coughlin has received from the Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF). Funding through the **Post-Secondary Education Support Program** has allowed him to focus his time and energy on his education.

"The MMF was a large part of how I was able to focus on school rather than sort of juggling jobs along the side," he said. "That made it possible for me to

truly focus on school and on my studies and (to) treat my studies as a job." Coughlin credits the support from the MMF for his ability to excel beyond his undergrad, from holding his past research positions and his acceptance to Perimeter Institute.

"I was able to focus and put all of my effort into my studies," he added. "It's something I'm truly thankful for, and I'm glad that these services are available to Métis students. It's truly incredible and absolutely important for how I got to where I am."


Moreover, as the Vice President of the Canadian Indigenous Science and Engineering Society, Grift is dedicated to ensuring Indigenous youth are well represented and heavily supported in the STEM field.

Her responsibilities include the important task of securing funding for Indigenous youth's attendance at academic conferences, with efforts extending to organizing events that enable Indigenous students to build their professional networks and enjoy opportunities that they may otherwise have missed.

Grift's journey through the STEM field began with her undergraduate degree in Biology at the U of W. Her passion for research got her enrolled in a research program, that soon placed her in a respiratory

physiology lab, where she is currently working on her honours thesis.

Her ambitions take her ahead to a future where she dreams of becoming a physician and conducting part-time research on clinical trials and studies. For her, research signifies being at the forefront of medicine. "I like the idea of constantly contributing to that pool of knowledge," Grift said.

endeavour Grift's constant is to bridge the gap between the wisdom of the elders and the youth in her community. Drawing from her personal experience of the absence of Indigenous representation in STEM, she is determined to foster an environment for the next generation of Indigenous scientists. researchers and doctors that she herself once felt was lacking.

"I want to be the representation that I never had by creating the

conditions for others that I would've wanted. I don't want the next generation of Indigenous students to feel like they don't belong in science," she said.

As a child, her excitement for science sparked when she was able to help make a tooth mould during a routine trip to the dentist. It's moments like these, Grift says, that help her inspire and guide the next generation of budding Indigenous STEM students through her advocacy work.

Grift believes that everyone is smarter than they think they are, capable of achieving more than they foresee. She encourages everyone to remain curious, ask questions and never hesitate to approach people who can help.

"You need to believe that you are capable", she says, "If you don't think you're capable, you just need to keep pushing. Eventually, you will get there."

Connor Church Strives for Wrestling Greatness

Connor Church is fresh off winning a national gold medal in wrestling and is looking to jump to the next level.

The 19-year-old Red River Métis from Winnipeg is one of 20 Canadians competing at the U20 Pan American Championship in Oaxtepec, Mexico, from July 8-10.

For Church, combat sports have been a huge part of his upbringing, which he attributes to his father.

"He put me in (different classes) right since I was a little kid, and then I grew up and did a bit of hockey, but as I got older and older, I started excelling at boxing and wrestling," he said.

"And then, that competitive nature came over me. You keep winning, and I really like(d) this feeling, and I wanted to keep getting more of this, and I ended up just switching and solely doing combat sports."

Church vividly remembers attending the Manitoba Métis Federation Road to Gold sports camps, which also helped him gain a passion for wrestling.

"They built confidence, and they get you into the sport. (Those camps) were a great way to meet people, have fun, get a good workout in, and stay fit," he said. "I want to say, part of the things that keep you in the sport are those Road to Gold camps I did when I was younger."

In May, Church participated in the 2022 Canadian National Wrestling Trials in Edmonton and competed in the Junior Freestyle 79 kg category. Church admitted he had no idea what to expect.

"I had only been to one national (tournament) before because of injuries and COVID, and that was when I was 13. So, anyone who knows me knows that my goal for the longest time was to win a national

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championship, but I've been kept out," the wrestler said. "I had no idea what the competition was like and how I'd stack up against other kids in Canada."

Church flew to Edmonton a few days before the event to fit in some practice and acclimate to the time change. He said the most nerve-wracking part of his experience was the weigh-in process.

"Every wrestler competing was cramped in one little basement of this hotel and are half-naked in our singlets, dehydrated and hungry. Everyone was deadfaced, looking to weigh in, get out of there, and eat as soon as possible," he said. "I made weight, so it was no big deal. I didn't have to cut any weight at all. So it was a breeze."

After weigh-ins, Church was eager to compete in the tournament but had one last priority before starting - seeing his family.

"My dad, my little brother, and my grandma were there, so that was a big moment, being able to see them for the first time in months," he said. "I moved away to Montreal, so now I never get to see them. It was important for me to have my dad there, my little brother, and my grandma too. It was a big deal for me."

The 2022 Canadian National Wrestling Trials were Church's first time competing in the Junior category, and he knew he would be wrestling older, bigger kids.

"The wrestling itself was honestly a breeze. I 10-pointed everyone 10-0, so it went smoothly, exactly according to the game plan, and (the wrestling) couldn't have gone better," said Church.

"In wrestling, the rule is: if there's a 10-point spread, the match is over. So, if it's 10-0, 12-2, or 14-4, the match is over. You win by technical superiority."

After breezing through the round-robin, Church faced Jai Sodhi of GTA Alliance Wrestling Club for the gold medal.

"My match only lasted one minute. It was one takedown. I turned (my opponent), and it was over," he said. "Then, I got up, and it was crazy. I didn't even realize what had just happened. I was like, 'wow, I just won!"

Church remembers the referee raising his hand in victory, then going over to his coach, Dave Zilberman, who gave him a big hug, and Victor Zilberman, his other coach, offered words of encouragement.

"(He told me), 'You work(ed) hard for this all year, and this is what happens when athletes work hard. You really deserve this,'" Church recalled.

"(When I looked up), it (was) all my teammates, my dad, my grandma, my little brother, and all my friends. Everyone was there, and they were screaming, cheering me on. It was a crazy moment that I think I'll cherish for the rest of my life."

With nationals in the rear-view mirror, Church now shifts his focus to the U20 Pan American Championship, which includes wrestlers from the United States, Brazil, Jamaica, Costa Rica, and many other countries competing for the gold. He's been training hard for this moment and admitted it took a while for his new reality to set in.

"After I got home for three, four days, that switch in my head just turned. Now, it's like I'm not going to be happy if I do anything besides go and win that tournament," he exclaimed.

"I've doubled down on training, and everything is going good. It's just that competitive edge of me. I need to go and win that tournament."

While not training for wrestling with the Montreal Wrestling Club, Church studies business management at Concordia University. He is also a part of the Concordia Stingers wrestling team.

Not only will the Red River Métis wrestler look to medal at the U20 Pan American Championships, he will also be vying for a spot at the U20 World Championships this August in Sofia, Bulgaria.

All in all, Church has one focus for this upcoming tournament.

"If I win that gold medal, I'd love to run around the wrestling mat with the massive Métis flag on my shoulders," said Church. "That's a dream of mine, and I feel like it's going to come true in July, coming up in Mexico."

Red River Métis opera singer, Camryn Dewar, is disrupting the norms of classical music, preparing to shine in *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* at the Manitoba Opera.

The rippling notes of a practiced soprano emerge from the Centennial Concert Hall. They belong to Camryn Dewar, a rising opera star disrupting the norm with her Scottish/Scandanavian and Red River Métis roots.

Dewar, 22, originally from Stony Mountain, Man., brings a potent cultural blend to opera, traditionally known for its European popularity. Growing up, she said, her entire family was musical. Her father played bagpipes and her grandmother taught her folk songs on the piano, inspiring her love of music.

Dewar later received her undergraduate degree in music from the University of Manitoba and her journey continues as she undertakes her master's degree in music, focusing on vocal performance, at Montclair State University in New Jersey. Her initial plunge into opera was at age 13 with the children's chorus at the Manitoba Opera.

Dewar reminisces, "I remember standing on the concert hall stage, singing, and looking at the thousands of people in the audience and thinking "this is want I want to do."

Upon realizing her passion as an opera singer, Dewar honed her craft at the Royal Conservatory of Music, sharpening her sharpening her musical skills in voice, piano, guitar, and saxophone

Then, through the *Believe - Elite*Athletic and Artistic Support
Program delivered by the Manitoba Métis Federation's (MMF)

Department, Dewar trained at

the heart of the art form, Tuscany, Italy, which she credits for deepening her understanding of both the Italian culture and her Red River Métis heritage.

"The connection of people to their music in Italian culture reminds me of the culture of Red River Métis people," shares Dewar. "For us, it's not just singing or playing an instrument, but also about honouring the historical and cultural significance of music."

Li Keur, among the first Red River Métis operas to be featured on a main stage in Canada, is an amalgamation of history, mysticism, and a host of themes critical to the heritage of the Red River Métis.

Marking Dewar's first time performing in a role that shines a spotlight on her Red River Métis heritage, she shares, the experience itself has been an awakening to a legacy more complex than she had ever imagined.

"Li Keur is breaking traditional norms. It's creating space for Indigenous people to talk about our culture while singing in an art form that is new to many people," says Dewar.

"One of the most exciting things about this production to me is hearing the female voice and the female perspective," she explains.

As most athletes would do after failing a tryout, they would quit. On the other hand, I was one of

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
those players who decided to strive to work even harder on my ringette skills"

The Impact of the ISET Program


Métis Employment & Training (MET) empowers Citizens to strive for and achieve their full potential.

t has been a resounding year for the Métis Employment & Training (MET) Department at the Manitoba Métis Federation. The Indigenous Skills and Employment Training (ISET) Agreement with Canada, splitting the strings of progress, continues to reverberate positively in the lives of Red River Métis communities in Manitoba, and across Canada.

The ISET program's ten-year labour market approach, signed in 2019, has been critical in accelerating work prospects for indigenous communities by improving skills and facilitating strategies that align with labor market demands.

In 2023, over 2,000 clients were served, leading to more than 800 individuals attaining meaningful employment and over 900 being supported in funded programs.





These achievements were made possible through the collaboration of the MMF and Government of Canada. The Federation has long focused on developing partnerships, not just with the Canadian government but also with a diverse pool of private industries, non-profit and community organizations, and educational institutions.

Capitalizing on the success of the Aboriginal Skills Employment and Training Strategy, the

ISET Program further bolsters efforts to propel the country's Indigenous population into the country's overall economic land-

-scape. The revised strategy warrants increased funding flexibility and respects the cultural nuances of Canada's Indigenous communities.

ISET and prior labour market strategies have allowed the MMF, through the MET Department, to provide employment and training programs and services for over 25 years.

MET programs have assisted thousands of Red River Métis Citizens to gain the skills, training, and education needed to successfully compete in Manitoba's and Canada's labour

market by obtaining sustainable and meaningful employment.

The ISET Program builds on what was successful about ASETS and reflects what was heard from Indigenous partners to include:

- a co-developed program with Indigenous partners;
- increased funding;
- greater flexibility for organizations to design programming to meet the needs of their people and communities; and
- a new distinctions-based strategy that recognizes, respects and reflects



offering an extensive variety of culturally rich and sports-driven programs, Métis Employment & Training (MET) – Youth Programming fosters ample opportunities that help young people of the Red River Métis community soar. The organization underlined its central role in cultural exploration, capacity building, and development of youth attributes in its annual report for 2022-2023.

MET - Youth Programming, part of Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF), has crafted numerous initiatives with funding from Urban Programming for Indigenous Peoples (UPIP) and Indigenous Skills Employment Training (ISET). These initiatives bolster avenues for Red River Métis youth, amplifying strengths and sparking meaningful economic and social transformation.

Métis Employment & Training (MET) - Youth Programming offers culturally-rich programs for youth, promoting growth and strengthening the future of the Red River Métis Nation.

A strong emphasis on cultural learning forms the core of the department's approach. Workshop examples include fiddle lessons, jigging, beading circles, and moccasin making – each twining together time-honoured Red River Métis traditions with contemporary skills and interests.

A new program dubbed 'Land Based Learning' solidifies a profound connection with the earth, an integral aspect of Red River Métis culture.

MET's Sport Camps, including Hockey camps, weave in the spirit of positive sportsmanship, teamwork, and individual skill development. These camps give Red River Métis Youth an inclusive platform to recognize their potential and continue their athletic journey.

TheIndividualYouthSupportProgram,whichprovides, annual reimbursements for Red River Métis Youth



participating in sports, cultural, and recreational activities, saw a marked rise in applications. In the previous year, 1,433 young people were supported through the program.

In addition to these, MMF's ambitious 'Believe Elite Athletic and Artistic Support Program' supports gifted athletes and artists. The ambitiousness of this initiative is evident in how it encourages Red River Métis Youth to create a strong foundation and strive towards their goals.

Ste. Madeleine Days gathering featured a youth campsite, where young attendees not only enjoyed camping but also took charge of serving meals to elders, reinforcing the valuable connections between youth and elders.

MET - Youth Programming also organized a Youth and Elders Gathering that aimed at bridging the generational gap, increasing awareness, and keeping elders prominent within the community

Four culturally significant workshops were held, including beading and sewing, canning, harvesting, and a Medicine Walk, offering youth an enriched look at their traditions. Additionally, a 'Youth Consultation' brought together young Red River Métis from all over Manitoba, creating a space for open dialogue about the effectiveness of various programming initiatives and their personal growth.
